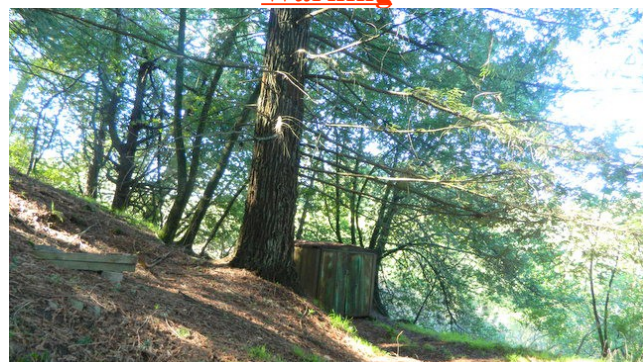
We put in thousands of pounds of tree & vegetation debris that were all moved by hand and all this was very impressive!

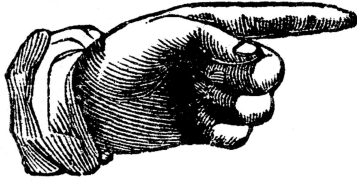


Heinz Loop's Metal shed

At the moment, I'm looking forward to volunteering with the Sunday Public Train rides -- I enjoy working with the public.

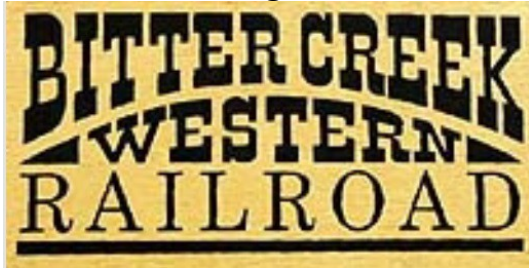
My wife passed away last year and as a part of recovering from my grief, I'm volunteering in our community. And that's why I'm here.

Security: Jon Sargent mentioned that we did have a group of trespassers on the property in January in the late hours, but they were scared off when they encountered our security camera system. Jon sent the video clip to Ellen Thomsen next door and the East Bay Regional Park District.

Membership: Sammy Tamez announced that any new or prospective members here to please meet in the kitchen after the meeting.

CallBoy/Web Site/Library: Pat Young reported that everything seems to be going well here.

Minutes of the Board Meeting

Present Board Officers: Jon Sargent, Jerry Kimberlin, Lisa Kimberlin, Sarah Buhre, Rick Reaves, Stephen Fares, Sammy Tamez.

Approval of Last Month's Meeting Minutes: Stephen Fares moves to approve it, and Rick Reaves seconded it. With no discussion, the motion carried 7-0.

Old Business:

Clean Up and Yard Work: We still have two pickup loads worth of brush beyond the roundhouse but probably not enough to fill the large dumpster that the East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) dropped off for us. Likely we will not need the dumpster and Jon Sargent will call the Park to come get it.

New Business:

Spring Meet: We need to firm up the plans & permit application for the Spring Meet with the EBRPD. Sarah Buhre will look at the forms with Jon Sargent & Matt Petach to make sure it's all filled out along with insurance. We are not going to get porta-potties because we will likely not have the number of visitors or the need for them. If the public needs to use a restroom, they can use the one in the clubhouse or head up to Redwood Valley.

Tree Removal: Jon Sargent got a company referral for tree removal service for the tree on Boyer's Bluff. He will call them to schedule it and Rich Croll will show Jon which tree it is.

Clerici Engine Donation: Bob Walker talked to Rich about the trench engine that is being donated. There was a pile of parts that came with it but it seems well built & weighs a ton. The easiest solution for it is to pull the current engine out and go electric. Rich is compiling a list of what needs to be done and how much that will cost. It will need a 1000-watt motor & parts, totaling about \$1,500. It's a good engine for the club to keep.

Rick Reaves moved that the Board authorize \$2,000 to cover everything and it was seconded by Stephen Fares. With no discussion, the motion passed 7-0.

Club's Rail Bender: Out by the roundhouse is a rail bender on a bench, but the bench has collapsed. Rick Reaves said they tried to use it when they did the rebuild, but Bill Smith just used a corner of the bridge to bend the track.

Rich Croll wants to get rid of it and has sent in the details & photos to editor Pat Young for a For Sale ad in the CallBoy which can be found at the end of this issue.

Black Diamond Mine Tank: There's a tank out near the Black Diamond Mine building that was on a frame that collapsed and we need to look into what to do with it. Rich Croll has the water tower that was on the hill and is repairing it.

Bulger Barn Track: We have a middle track at the Bulger barn available to the club for club equipment. We also have a track in the long barn so we are not out of space for club engines & rolling stock.

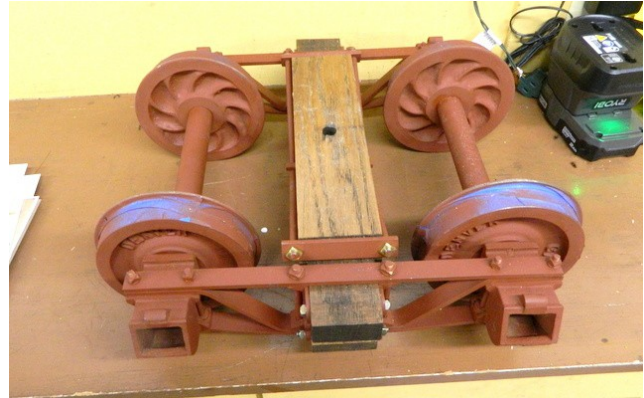
Propane Tank Icing Over: Rich Croll wants to buy at least one or two propane heater blankets to go around the tank, costing approximately \$70 - \$200, depending on quality and they draw about 1 amp each. Heating the tanks first thing in the morning might help with the icing problem because warm propane tanks might not freeze as quickly. Rich says he can probably put three vertical propane tanks in the new box car, so they don't freeze as quickly.

General Updates:

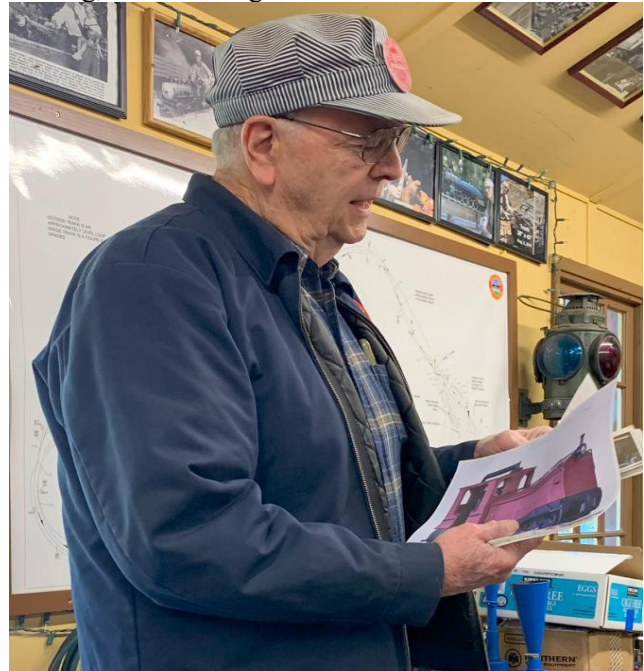

Rich Croll brought in one of the two trucks he just manufactured for his 2½" scale log car, which he believes he will have completed by next month's meeting, and knowing Rich that is a safe bet!



The club is now the permanent caretaker of the partially constructed Trench Locomotive by the late Andy Clerici and Rich was asked to assess the parts & construction so a plan could be formed.



Doing some preliminary research Rich believes it is based on a Schneider locomotive, also referred to as “Loco Tractors,” and is of French origin. An interesting item Rich mentioned regarding construction is the use of angled gearboxes salvaged from outboard motors.

Among the items he talked about were an unused Southern Pacific Police jacket,



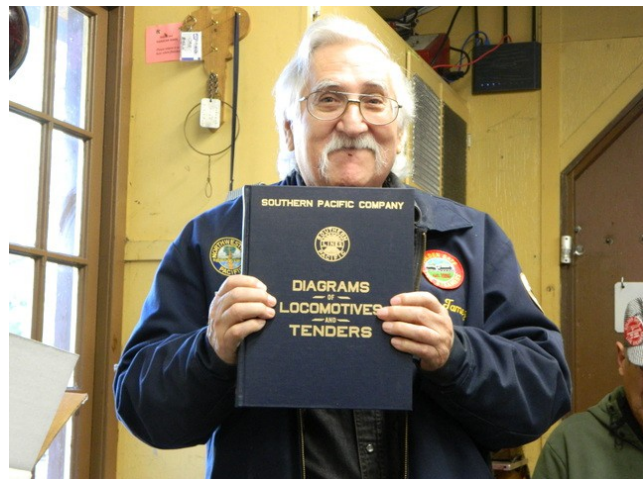
an Eagle Eye hat which Sammy received for spotting a “hot box” (an overheated axle box on a freight car truck) condition on a train & alerting the train crew,

and finally closing with a Southern Pacific book titled “Diagrams of Locomotives & Tenders”.



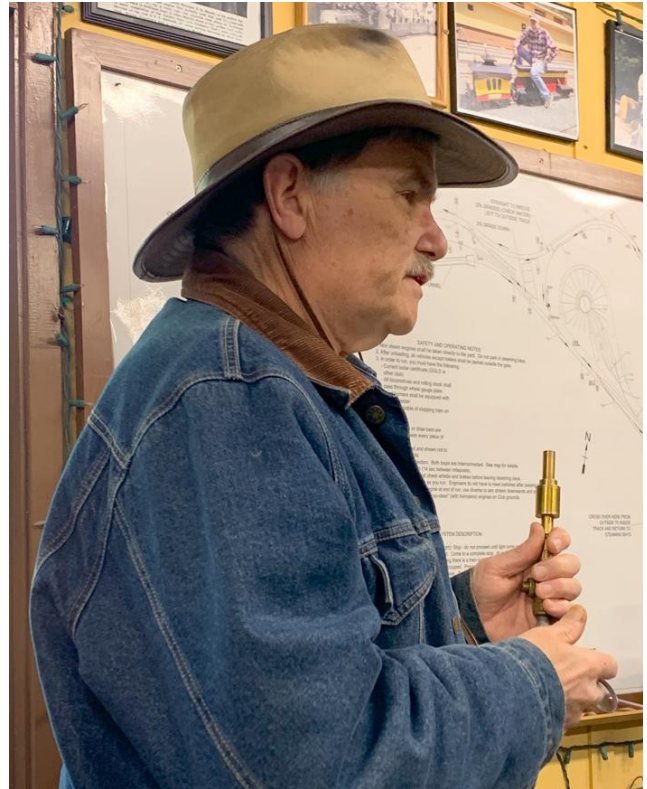

The model is well proportioned, pleasing to the eye and shows a grasp of mechanical design.

¼" scale Case Steam Tractor Engine

March 10, 2025



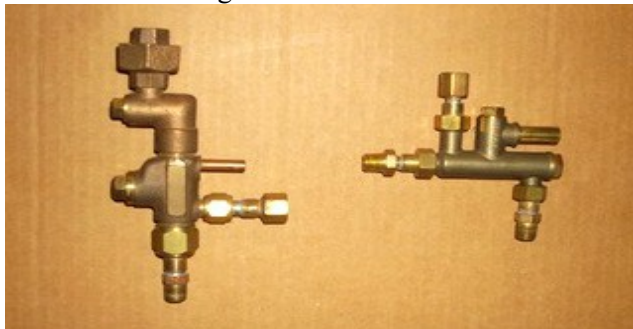
This is a model of a ¼" scale Case steam traction engine. The tractor was professionally built by Turning Mfg. in 1993, has a steel welded boiler and is coal fired.

The length is 5'4", width is 29" wide at the rear wheel axle, and the rear wheels are 19½" in diameter.

The total weight is close to 500 pounds without water in the boiler & feed tank.

The safety valve pressure is set to lift at 150 PSI and there is a ASME standard soft plug in the crown sheet.

The boiler feed pump is driven from the engine and the governor works to control load speed. Also included is a full set of drawings.



Included are two injectors (one of them is a super scale type) and extra front wheels.
